



## Memoirs


***Feeling Jewish: (A Book for Just About Everyone)*** / Devorah Baum / 655 BAU


***Justice Failed: How "Legal Ethics" Kept Me in Prison for 26 Years*** / Alton Logan / 650 LOG

 A compelling and lucid account of the life and teachings of a founder of rabbinic Judaism and one of the most beloved heroes of Jewish history.







***Something Beautiful Happened: A Story of Survival and Courage in the Face of Evil***


***This Close to Happy: A Reckoning with Depression*** / Daphne Merkin / 656.1 MER

## **Nonfiction**

***Bad Rabbi: And Other Strange but True Stories from the Yiddish Press*** / Eddy Portnoy / 503 POR

An underground history of downwardly mobile Jews, *Bad Rabbi* exposes the seamy underbelly of pre-WWII New York and Warsaw, the two major centers of Yiddish culture in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. With true stories plucked from the pages of the Yiddish papers, Eddy Portnoy introduces readers to the Jewish drunks, thieves, murderers, wrestlers, poets and beauty queens whose misadventures were immortalized in print.




***Detroit 1967: Origins, Impacts, Legacies*** / Joel Stone / 775.4 STO

“Fifty years later, native Detroiters cite the 1967 riots as pivotal in the city's history, yet few completely understand what happened, why it happened, or how it continues to affect the city today. Discussions of the events are often rife with misinformation and myths, and seldom take place across racial lines. Joel Stone's intention with *Detroit 1967*: is to draw memories, facts and analysis together to create a broader context for these conversations.


***Hillel at Michigan: 1926/27-1945: Struggles of Jewish Identity in a Pivotal Era***

*The Pharmacist of Auschwitz* is the little-known story of Victor Capesius, a Bayer pharmaceutical salesman from Romania who, at the age of 35, joined the Nazi SS in 1943 and quickly became the chief pharmacist at Auschwitz. Contains mature themes.




***Sons and Soldiers: The Untold Story of the Jews Who Escaped the Nazis and Returned with the U.S. Army to Fight Hitler*** / Bruce Henderson / 736.4 HEN

Joining the ranks of *Unbroken*, *Band of Brothers* and *Boys in the Boat*, this little-known saga of young German Jews dubbed the Ritchie Boys, who fled Nazi Germany in the 1930s, came of age in America and returned to Europe at enormous personal risk as members of the U.S. Army to play a key role in the Allied victory.




***The Kelloggs: The Battling Brothers of Battle Creek*** / Howard Markel / 775.4 MAR



## Fiction




***The Devil and Webster* / Jean Hanff Korelitz / FIC KORELITZ**




***Lilli De Jong: A Novel* / Janet Benton / FIC BENTON**




***The Rules of Magic: A Novel* / Alice Hoffman / FIC HOFFMAN**



## Kids & Parenting Books



In *Bake Sales Are My B\*tch*, she gets into the nitty-gritty of food allergies, from deadly serious reactions to how to deal with those who don't take your kid's allergy seriously. Whether you're a freaked-out parent or not, Peveteaux lends some much-needed guidance and teaches you to make party foods that'll be a surefire hit.

***Hanukkah Cookies with Sprinkles* / David A. Adler / J 247.5 ADL**

As Hanukkah approaches, a season of light and hope, Sara discovers that tzedakah can be as bright and colorful as a Hanukkah cookie with sprinkles.




***Her Right Foot* / Dave Eggers / J 771.5 EGG**

Although separated by continents and decades, Josef, a Jewish boy living in 1930s Nazi Germany; Isabel, a Cuban girl trying to escape the riots and unrest plaguing her country in 1994; and Mahmoud, a Syrian boy in 2015 whose homeland is torn apart by violence and destruction, embark on harrowing journeys in search of refuge, discovering shocking connections that tie their stories together.

Izzy and Olivia Bloom regale their Shabbat guests with the story of their Sabbath lamp, which Izzy's great-great-grandfather and his family brought piece-by-piece when they immigrated to America.
